# What is Etoricoxib?

Vhat is Etoricoxib?

Etoricoxib contains the active substance etoricoxib. Etoricoxib is one of a group of medicines called selective COX-2 inhibitors. These belong to a family of medicines called non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs).

### What is Etoricoxib used for?

- What is Etoricoxib used for? Etoricoxib helps to reduce the pain and swelling (inflammation) in the joints and muscles of people 16 years of age and older with osteoarthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, ankylosing spondylitis and gout. Etoricoxib is also used for the short term treatment of moderate pain after dental
- surgery in people 16 years of age and older.

Surgery in people 16 years of age and older What is osteoarthritis?

Osteoarthritis is a disease of the joints. It results from the gradual breakdown of cartilage that cushions the ends of the bones. This causes swelling (inflammation), pain, tenderness, stiffness and disability.

### What is rheumatoid arthritis?

what is meumatoid arthritis is. Rheumatoid arthritis is a long term inflammatory disease of the joints. It causes pain, stiffness, swelling, and increasing loss of movement in the joints it affects. It may also cause inflammation in other areas of the body.

### What is gout?

Gout is a disease of sudden, recurring attacks of very painful inflammation and redness in the joints. It is caused by deposits of mineral crystals in the joint.

# What is ankylosing spondylitis? Ankylosing spondylitis is an inflammatory disease of the spine and large joints.

# What you need to know before you take Etoricoxib

## Do not take Etoricoxib if:

- o not take Etoricoxib it:
  you are allergic to etoricoxib or any of the
  other ingredients of this medicine (listed in
  section 6)
  you are allergic to non-steroidal
  anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), including
  acetylsalicylic acid (aspirin) and COX-2
  inhibitors (see Possible Side Effects, section 4)
  you have a current stomach ulcer or

- inhibitors (see Possible Side Effects, section 4) you have a current stomach ulcer or bleeding in your stomach or intestines you have serious liver disease you are or could be pregnant or are breast-feeding (see 'Pregnancy, breast-feeding and fertility') you are under 16 years of age you have inflammatory bowel disease, such as Crohn's Disease, Ulcerative Colitis, or Colitis
- you have high blood pressure that has not been controlled by treatment (check with your doctor or nurse if you are not sure whether your blood pressure is adequately
- whether your blood pressure is adequately controlled) your doctor has diagnosed heart problems including heart failure (moderate or severe types), angina (chest pain) you have had a heart attack, bypass surgery, peripheral arterial disease (poor circulation in legs or feet due to narrow or blocked arteries) blocked arteries)
- you had any kind of stroke (including mini-stroke, transient ischaemic attack or TIA). Etoricoxib may slightly increase your risk of heart attack and stroke and this is why it should not be used in those who have already had heart problems or stroke.

If you think any of these are relevant to you, do not take the tablets until you have consulted your doctor.

  Warnings and precautions

  Talk to your doctor or pharmacist before taking Etoricoxib if you:

   have a history of stomach bleeding or ulcers

   are dehydrated, for example by a prolonged bout of vomiting or diarrhoea

   have swelling due to fluid retention

   have a history of heart failure, or any other form of heart disease

   have a history of high blood pressure.

  Etoricoxib can increase blood pressure in some people, especially in high doses, and some people, especially in high doses, and your doctor will want to check your blood
- your doctor will want to eneck your blood pressure from time to time have any history of liver or kidney disease are being treated for an infection. Etoricoxib can mask or hide a fever, which is a sign of infection

- have diabetes, high cholesterol, or are a smoker. These can increase your risk of heart disease

If you are not sure if any of the above apply to you, talk to your doctor before taking Etoricoxib to see if this medicine is suitable for you.

Toryou. Etoricoxib works equally well in elderly and younger adult patients. If you are over 65 years of age, your doctor will want to appropriately keep a check on you. No dose adjustment is necessary for patients over 65 years of age.

Children and adolescents
Do not give this medicine to children and adolescents under 16 years of age.

Other medicines and Etoricoxib
Tell your doctor or pharmacist if you are taking, have recently taken or might take any other medicines, including medicines obtained without a prescription.

In particular if you are taking any of the following medicines, your doctor may want to monitor you to check that your medicines are working properly, once you start taking Etoricoxib:
• medicines that thin your blood

- medicines that thin your blood (anticoagulants), such as warfarin rifampicin (an antibiotic) methotrexate (a medicine used for suppressing the immune system, and often used in rheumatoid arthritis) ciclosporin or tacrolimus (medicines used for suppressing the immune system) lithium (a medicine used to treat some types of depression) medicines used to help control high blood.

- medicines used to help control high blood pressure and heart failure called ACE pressure and near failure called ACE inhibitors and angiotensin receptor blockers, examples include enalapril and ramipril, and losartan and valsartan diuretics (water tablets) digoxin (a medicine for heart failure and irregular heart rhythm) minoxidil (a medicine used to treat high blood pressure).

# Pregnancy, breast-feeding and fertility

Pregnancy, Dreast-reeding and Tertility
Pregnancy
Etoricoxib must not be taken during
pregnancy. If you are pregnant or think you
could be pregnant, or if you are planning to
become pregnant, do not take the tablets. If
you become pregnant, stop taking the tablets
and consult your doctor. Consult your doctor
if you are unsure or need more advice.

Breast-feeding
It is not known if etoricoxib is excreted in human milk. If you are breast-feeding, or planning to breast-feed, consult your doctor before taking Etoricoxib. If you are using Etoricoxib, you must not breast-feed.

Fertility
Etoricoxib is not recommended in women attempting to become pregnant.

# Driving and using machines

Dizziness and sleepiness have been reported in some patients taking Etoricoxib. Do not drive if you experience dizziness or sleepiness.

# 3 How to take Etoricoxib

Always take this medicine exactly as your doctor or pharmacist has told you. Check with your doctor or pharmacist if you are not sure. There are different strengths available for this medicinal product and depending on your disease your doctor will prescribe the tablet strength that is appropriate for you.

The recommended dose is:

# Osteoarthritis

The recommended dose is 30 mg once a day, increased to a maximum of 60 mg once a day if needed.

## Rheumatoid arthritis

The recommended dose is 60 mg once a day, increased to a maximum of 90 mg once a day if needed.

## Ankylosing spondylitis

The recommended dose is 60 mg once a day, increased to a maximum of 90 mg once a day if needed.

Acute pain conditions
Etoricoxib should be used only for the acute painful period.

The recommended dose is 120 mg once a day which should only be used for the acute painful period, limited to a maximum of 8 days treatment.

Postoperative dental surgery pain
The recommended dose is 90 mg once daily,
limited to a maximum of 3 days treatment.

- People with liver problems

  if you have mild liver disease, you should not take more than 60 mg a day

  if you have moderate liver disease, you should not take more than 30 mg a day.

Do not take more than the recommended dose for your condition. Your doctor will want to discuss your treatment from time to time. It is important that you use the lowest dose that controls your pain and you should not take Etoricoxib for longer than necessary. This is because the risk of heart attacks and strokes might increase after prolonged strokes might increase after prolonged treatment, especially with high doses.

Use in children and adolescents
Etoricoxib should not be taken by children or adolescents under 16 years of age.

No dose adjustment is necessary for elderly patients. As with other medicines, caution should be exercised in elderly patients.

# Method of administration Etoricoxib is for oral use.

Take tablets once a day. Etoricoxib can be taken with or without food.

If you take more Etoricoxib than you should You should never take more tablets than the doctor recommends. If you do take too many Etoricoxib tablets, you should seek medical attention immediately.

# If you forget to take Etoricoxib

to take Etoricoxib as your doctor has prescribed. If you miss a dose, just resume your usual schedule the following day. Do not take a double dose to make up for the forgotten tablet.

If you have any further questions on the use of this medicine, ask your doctor or pharmacist.



# 4 Possible side effects

Like all medicines, this medicine can cause Like all medicines, this medicine can cause side effects, although not everybody gets them. If you develop any of these signs you should stop Etoricoxib and talk to your doctor immediately (see What you need to know before you take Etoricoxib section 2):

shortness of breath, chest pains, or ankle swelling appear or if they get worse
yellowing of the skin and eyes (jaundice) – these are signs of liver problems
severe or continual stomach pain or your stools become black
an allergic reaction- which can include skin problems such as ulcers or blistering, or swelling of the face, lips, tongue, or throat which may cause difficulty in breathing.

# How to store Etoricoxib

# Keep this medicine out of the sight and reach of children.

Do not use this medicine after the expiry date Do not use this medicine after the expiry date which is stated on the carton and blister after EXP. The expiry date refers to the last day of the month.

Store in the original package in order to protect from light.

Do not use this medicine if you notice visible signs of deterioration.

Do not throw away any medicines via wastewater or household waste. Ask your

wastewater or household waste. Ask your pharmacist how to throw away medicines you no longer use. These measures will help to protect the environment.
